"You must change in order to survive." -- Pearl Bailey Autumn is a time of anticipation and change and truly the best season to open a new AAUW year. The leaves are turning, the sun light is different, the sky a deeper blue, and the air crisper. Like the season, our AAUW branch is getting ready to head into a year of celebrating change.

The first notable change is that we have resurrected publication of our newsletter after a year hiatus. Thanks to Donna Weidman for volunteering to reactivate "Foliage" on a quarterly basis. We hope this will again be a way for all of you stay informed of what AAUW is doing locally, regionally, and nationally.

Second, a number of our programs this year will focus on change. The Dinner and Forum on September 24 is a chance to hear from a trio of human rights luminaries and legends who exemplify how "the power of one" can transform the world. Titled "*I Am The Change*," this forum promises to inspire us to launch our own ideas into action. At our annual luncheon and silent auction on November 21, you'll hear from the three vouna women who attended the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL). Learning how this is a transforming experience for the attendees is always a source of pride for our organization. Then, in March, we are collaborating with the Chippewa Falls branch to bring together a panel of local activists -- women who are and have been working for change - who walk the talk.

Third, our primary fundraising effort - the used book sale—will have a new twist this year. Rita Houser has arranged to have Norske Nook pies donated for a raffle and to have Cindee Borton-Parker autographing copies of "The Norske Nook Book Pies and Other Recipes" cookbook on Sunday, October 4, during the bag sale day. We hope this will draw more customers to the sale. As

many of you know, the proceeds from the sale support scholarships for returning female students at UW-Eau Claire who are working hard to change their lives, and often their children's, by earning a degree, an increasingly more expensive goal.

Finally, you have an opportunity to advocate for legislative change. AAUW Wisconsin sponsors a Legislative Day every two years. This year's day of action will be October 15 in Madison. It's a chance to voice your concerns about issues that affect women, such as healthcare, pay equity, and family leave, in person before the people who vote on legislation.

Embrace the season with a renewed commitment to keep AAUW-Eau Claire a brilliant branch on the AAUW tree.
