

I was sitting at breakfast with other public policy chairs, when someone said, "Here comes Lisa!" Lisa Maatz sat next to me, and I asked who she was. It turns out that she is our national Director of Public Policy and Government Relations and a real dynamo of a woman. She was just coming off an action-packed week, chock full of Equity Day promotions, testifying on Capitol Hill, and the AAUW evaluation of President Obama's first 100 days. Whew!

Lisa rallied the entire convention to become lobbyists on the spot and to call Senator Herb Kohl. As individuals, we are not always so easily moved to action, but she inspired us to call Kohl's local representative—and his Washington office, to fill his voice mailboxes. She said to

thank him for his past support of AAUW issues, (he scores 100% in support of our issues), and to ask him to sign on as a co-sponsor of S. 182, a bill to amend the Fair Labor Standards Act. This bill will provide more effective remedies to victims of discrimination in the payment of wages on the basis of sex.

Women's Studies at UW-Eau Claire: 25 Years! Sarah Harder honored

The women's studies program at UW-Eau Claire recently honored Sarah Harder at the program's 25th anniversary celebration. A portion of the celebration focused on an oral history project conducted by a public history graduate student, and five undergraduates in Dr. Katherine Rhoades' "Feminist Analysis and Practices" course.

The students recorded interviews with seven accomplished women and one man who have made significant contributions to UW-Eau Claire's women's studies program and to feminism in the Chippewa Valley. In addition to Sarah, the oral history project includes interviews with AAUW members Dr. Rose-Marie Avin and Katie Bowman, plus Barbara Blackdeer-Mackenzie, Carol Fairbanks, Dr. David Jones, Dr. Susan Turell and Kaying Xiong. They all had stories to tell about women's and diversity issues and/or their personal struggles to achieve their goals.

Our branch is proud to see Sarah featured in the publication that was produced as part of the project, and in an exhibit. Both of these document Sarah's life as a feminist. The cover of Visions features her as she marched in support of the ERA in 1980. An online version can be found at Vision Magazine, complete with video and images. The exhibit can be viewed on second floor of UW-Eau Claire's McIntyre Library.

Sarah has been an AAUW-Eau Claire branch member for many years, and from 1985 to 1989 she served as the AAUW national president and board chairman of the Educational Foundation. She currently serves as president of the National Peace Foundation. When you see Sarah at branch meetings, please congratulate her and thank her for her activism in support of women's issues.
