
Book Group



Here are some of the daily suggestions from the Paycheck Fairness Act campaign. Did you contact Senator Herb Kohl's office to encourage him to sign on to the PFA? How many different ways did you choose to take action? Keep these ideas in mind for your next opportunity to be an advocate for the issues that are near and dear to AAUW members.

Call your Senators' DC offices & urge PFA passage in Sept.

Write a PFA "Get it Done" letter to the editor of your local newspaper Urge PFA passage on your Senators' Facebook pages.

Send a "Get it Done" equal pay e-card to friends & family. Get the men in your life to speak up for equal pay! It's a family issue!

Post a video on YouTube, urging the Senate to pass PFA in Sept. Write a PFA post or comment on your favorite blogs.

Add an equal pay twibbon to your Twitter avatar.

Reflections from NCCWSL:

National Conference for College Women Student Leaders: June 2010

Attending the AAUW Women's conference in June was definitely one the highlights of my summer. Gretchen and I became fast friends and really enjoyed exploring the Maryland campus and Washington D.C.. I had never been to D.C. before and the conference provided a really great way to network with other women from around the nation.

Our trip was off to a typical start when we missed our exit for the airport and were lost in downtown Minneapolis for about half an hour; however, thanks to Gretchen's mom navigating us via phone at 4AM we were able to find the airport and make it to our terminal with time to spare. Once we were through security and waiting in our terminal we began excitedly chatting about what to expect about the conference. The woman sitting in front of us, who had a beautiful head scarf on, turned around and asked if we were attending the AAUW conference in Maryland. We said yes and introduced ourselves, it turned out she was also attending along with six or seven other women from the Minneapolis area. Once they arrived we all said hello and continued to chat about our expectations.

That first experience in the terminal turned out to be a good representation of the three day conference. Overall, all the attendees were very friendly and warm which made for a comfortable and easy networking setting.

My favorite part of the conference, by far, was the Women of Distinction Award Ceremony. This took place on the opening night of the conference and the awardees were as follows: Dorothy Height, Christina Lagdameo, Patti Solis Doyle, Marie Tillman, and Nomfundo Walaza. Each woman had such a unique and inspiring story, and each had accomplished so much in their lifetime. It was really inspiring to see the effect that one individual's passion can have on a community and the world. Many of the women's stories had the audience in tears, and each recipient received a standing ovation.

Another aspect of the conference I really enjoyed was the time we were able to spend in Washington D.C.. Thursday morning Gretchen and I both attended the much sought after tour of the capitol building (this apparently was the field trip everyone wanted to attend but there was only space for 50 of us or so). It was fun, albeit a little unorganized (a fairly common critique I had of the

conference unfortunately) and the capitol building was absolutely stunning. On the following night we were given time to return to D.C. and explore on our own. Gretchen and I took advantage of this opportunity and headed into the city on the busses provided by NCCWSL. We went with another girl we had met, Nisha, who was from Boston. She was a riot and we had a great time eating in Chinatown and exploring all of the monuments on the hill.

Overall I think the conference was fun and worthwhile. To be honest, I didn't enjoy the keynote speaker as much as I had hoped to, and I was also shocked to find out how conservative many of the attendees and conference leaders were. At least half of the people in attendance did not identify with the term feminist or believe in a women's right to choose; this was probably most shocking to me because I was coming from a liberal Women's Studies program where everyone seems to agree on these issues. It was good to hear other's opinions and get a broader view of the nation's attitude.

I think NCCWSL is a worthwhile investment on the whole, especially for the experience it offers. I enjoyed having someone else to travel with, it made the whole thing less stressful, and I am truly grateful for the experience. Thank you AAUW Eau Claire!
