

Election Program: Tuesday, October 21

7 p.m.-First Congregational UCC

Geoffrey D. Peterson, Associate Professor of Political Science and Director, UWEC Political Research Institute, will be speaking about the election season up to this point and what is likely to come given what we have seen in past elections.



This should be a timely, informative session, as the General Election is just around the corner. Please join us!

Plans are in place for AAUW-Eau Claire to support the national Woman-to-Woman Voter Turnout Campaign this year. AAUW encourages branches to reach out to women and mobilize them to vote. Women vote in greater numbers than men according to the Center for American Women and Politics (2004). Because of the potential for women to determine the outcome of any election, politicians are increasingly seeking the women's vote, and giving women's issues more attention.

Approximately 4000 first-year UWEC students living on campus will be eligible to vote for the first time in a national election. There are many more students living off campus who are planning to vote but are not yet registered in Eau Claire, or do not have clear voting information. AAUW-Eau Claire will partner with UWEC Student Senate, University Centers, Housing, and Student Affairs, and assist in the university's efforts to support an informed voting community.

This plan will try to reach the first-time voters living on campus, new faculty and staff that have joined the university, and many current residents (student and staff) that may have moved/changed addresses and wards. Activities will include voter registration on campus, in classrooms, ice cream socials, fliers, and canvassing in student neighborhoods that are not being contacted by other voting groups.

Before October 16th

- Help register voters from 10:00-2:00 on the campus mall (1-2 volunteers-tableing)
- Help register voters from 3-7 at the Hilltop Dining Hall (1-2 volunteers-tableing)
- Canvassing student neighborhood 4 7 on October 1, 2, and 5th (need 10 volunteers-walking)
- Visit classrooms and register voters by request (1 deputized volunteer 5 minutes)
- Help at register voters at ice cream socials on campus (1-2 volunteers)
- Attend a Voter Registrar training at City Hall October 2, or October 9 and register women citywide.

After October 16th

- Canvassing (most effective, 1 in 14 additional votes)
- Call women first time and irregular voters and encourage them to vote (second most effective, 1 in 30 additional votes)
- Leafleting "I Will Vote" stickers, polling maps and information
- Talk to friends and neighbors and encourage them to vote

Please join the AAUW-Eau Claire "get out the vote" initiative! If you are able to volunteer a few hours please call or email one of your public policy co-chairs.



Catherine is a single mother and expresses her gratefulness to AAUW for investing in her and affirming her scholastic efforts.


