






BOOK GROUP

Dues are due!

If you have not yet paid your dues for this year, please renew your membership now. On November 1, AAUW national removes unpaid members from the database.

Dues are a little higher this year as a result of the increase in national dues from \$49 to \$59. State and branch dues remain the same at \$13 each.

As is true for many non-profit organizations, expenses continue to rise. The leadership at the national level, however, is actively seeking ways to off-set those costs by streamlining operational staffing, collaborating with other entities, and acquiring sponsors for programming. A \$10 increase is modest when considering the tremendous amount value AAUW provides, not only to us as branch members, but to women and girls throughout the nation. AAUW is a respected voice in the halls of Congress. AAUW research is top-notch and timely. Few other organizations reach out to assist women facing workplace discrimination. AAUW has funded the studies of women scholars in a host of academic areas. Membership with AAUW means you are part of a community dedicated to changing the climate for women and girls.

Here at the local level, you can participate at whatever level works for your schedule. The \$13 helps with some of our programming, but the annual used book sale remains our major source of revenue for awarding non-traditional women student academic scholarships and for supporting students attending the national AAUW Conference for Collegiate Women Student Leaders.

AAUW 2018 USED BOOK SALE


Remember the Who, What, When and Where about writing? To make it easier to explain the details of the book sale to someone, here it is in that format. Use this as your elevator speech!

PURPOSE: Proceeds help to support local and national scholarships and AAUW activities.

TITLE IX: MORE THAN ATHLETICS

In the 46 years since the part of the Education Act known as Title IX was passed, women's participation in sports and athletic programs has made great strides. AAUW and other organizations have worked tirelessly to make sure that the law is enforced. Title IX also affects other areas of education, including:

- recruitment, admissions and housing;
- career and technical education;
- pregnant, parenting, and/or married students;
- science, technology, engineering, and math education;
- sexual harassment and assault;
- comparable facilities and access to course offerings;
- financial assistance:
- student health services and insurance benefits;
- harassment based on gender identity.

Today the greatest area of concern is the attack on the sexual harassment area of this law. The regulations used to enforce the law may be weakened if the U.S. Department of Education proposals take effect. Changes would limit schools' liability in sexual harassment and assault cases, making it easier for schools to dismiss cases, harder to hold the perpetrators of assault accountable, and more difficult for survivors to get the protection they need.

What can you do?

Check aauw.org for action needed to keep the teeth in harassment laws; Join our branch initiative to identify local Title IX coordinators; Help deliver tools and resources to local schools; Write an op-ed to our local newspaper in support of Title IX.

Margot Bouchard is heading up our branch effort to take local action. Contact her to be part of this important initiative.

The November 6 election is coming up soon. Check myvote.wi.gov for your voter information. In addition to voting, pledge to encourage others to vote, be part of the Chippewa Valley Votes voter registration drive, and help serve at the polls.
